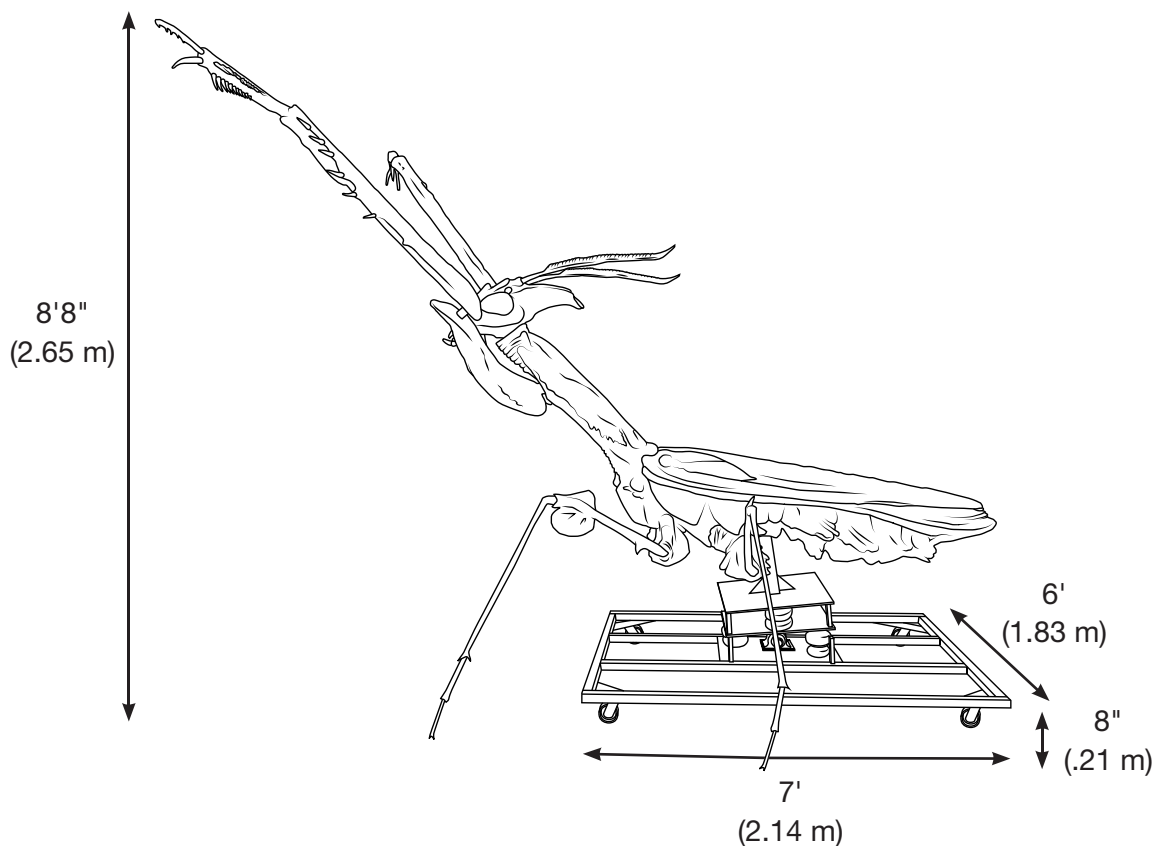


DEVIL'S FLOWER MANTIS



- The devil's flower mantis, impersonating a flower, remains motionless to lure prey; it's one of the largest species of praying mantis, possibly the largest that mimics flowers.
- When confronted, the devil's flower mantis initiates a deimatic display in an attempt to ward off predators.
- Its compound eyes are composed of thousands of individual photoreceptor cells. These photoreceptor cells give them a perceptual span of 180 degrees.
- Females deposit eggs in an ootheca built for ten to fifty nymphs, and typically hatching occurs after fifty days.
