The Lost Bird Project

The Lost Bird Project is an acclaimed sculpture installation by artist and sculptor Todd McGrain, featuring five extinct North American bird species — the passenger pigeon, great auk, Labrador duck, Carolina parakeet and heath hen. The Project uses art to raise awareness of vanished species and inspire a greater connection and stronger relationship with the Earth.

The Lost Bird Project's magnificent bronze sculptures will be displayed throughout the Zoo, with prints and photographs featured inside the Savanna Gallery. The breathtaking works of artists Charles Thomas and Katherine Cudney complement the importance of the conservation message of The Lost Bird Project. Thomas' landscapes pay tribute to the varied habitats that are vital to the preservation of species. Cudney's works highlight species brought back from the brink of extinction and the hope that their conservation success stories provide. All artwork will be for sale with a portion of the proceeds benefitting the non-profit Phoenix Zoo.



Dear Zoo Friends,

A few years ago, we rebranded our governing body as the Arizona Center for Nature Conservation. We did that because we wanted to emphasize our role as a conservation center, which is a very big part of who we are. When you come to the Zoo, you'll see the animals we are so fortunate to care for and we hope you have a fantastic time while you're here. But there is so much more that goes on at the Zoo (and beyond!) that you might not know about.

We've been working for some time on conserving jaguars in Costa Rica. As you'll read, this work involves establishing a corridor to connect jaguar populations and, more recently, installing an acoustic gunshot detection system to help reduce poaching of these endangered cats. Kinley Ragan, a Field Conservation Research



Technician here at the Zoo, shares her experiences on her first trip to Costa Rica. Additionally, Collection Manager of Primates Mary Yoder's work with sloths and other animals was not only personally satisfying, but equally as helpful. She shared some of the techniques we use here at the Zoo with the people at Rescue Center Costa Rica caring for orphaned animals, preparing them for reintroduction back to the wild. While Kinley is a part of our Conservation team, Mary was able to travel to Costa Rica through funding from the Conservation Grants Program here at the Zoo.

I am thrilled that Mary and Kinley are sharing their experiences with you. Our Conservation Grants Program provides staff with the opportunity to propose conservation projects around the world they'd like to pursue. Those proposals are reviewed annually as we select and fund projects that enable our staff to get hands-on experience in grassroots conservation efforts.

Times have really changed from when I first began my zoo career. Just a few decades ago, zoos and aquariums were much more focused on sustaining their individual animals than working on conserving those species in the wild. Today, zoos and aquariums around the world are devoting time, energy and resources to actively conserve wildlife and wild places. Our dedicated and passionate staff members have participated in some valuable conservation projects, sharing their knowledge and expertise, and bringing back enthusiasm to the Phoenix Zoo. I firmly believe that an important part of a leader's job is developing new leaders. We are very proud of our Conservation Grants Program and delighted to be able to provide development opportunities for our next generation of conservation leaders.

I hope you enjoy reading about these projects and look forward to seeing you at the Zoo soon.

After the babies had full crops and bellies, it was time to start cleaning sloth cages by having the young sloths (weighing anywhere from 500g to 2,000g) hold on to their stuffed animals to transport them in little bins so they could have fresh blankets and leaves. If a sloth had pooped, we would weigh the sloth and record it on a white board. It is important to track the weight of the sloths because if they started declining, they needed to be supplemented with milk. The rescue center has anywhere between 10-15 baby sloths on a given day.

Most of the animals at the center arrive orphaned after their mothers were electrocuted from trying to cross lines over the roadways. The animals are fed and rehabilitated until they can be released back into the wild where they were initially found.


Two-toed sloths eat a variety of leaves and can be supplemented with cooked green beans and carrots, whereas three-toed sloths only consume two types of plants and the fruit the plant produces. Their demeanor also varies drastically as two-toed sloths are more aggressive and will try to bite. However, three-toed sloths are very docile.

I was able to experience this firsthand as in the afternoons we would take the sloths out to nearby trees for climbing lessons. Some of the sloths enjoyed going outside and eating fresh leaves while gaining exercise, however, some were not happy to leave their blankets and stuffies and would try to bite or make a grunt-like sound to let you know of their displeasure.

Honestly, all their personalities and sounds they made were adorable!

I gained valuable experience working with such a diverse collection of animals and was able to impart new husbandry techniques and enrichment devices that we use here at the Phoenix Zoo.

I am so thankful for the experience!



Protecting the Path of the Jaguar

ary is not the only Phoenix Zoo team member to put her skills to work in Costa Rica this year. As part of a US Fish and Wildlife Service grant project, our Field Conservation Research team traveled to the Talamanca region of the country in January, building and testing anti-poaching technology in and around parks and protected areas. Working with partners from Arizona State University and ProCAT Costa Rica, we are helping secure safe passage for jaguars

moving between protected areas. Illegal hunting and habitat loss are major threats to jaguars and other wildlife in the region. In addition to anti-poaching technology, this project includes tree planting for habitat restoration and economic incentives for land management activities that support biodiversity (jaguar-friendly coffee and cacao, for example). Here are a few snapshots from the team's first trip in 2022. We look forward to sharing the next chapters of this story when they return from their next trip in May.



Made it! Dr. Garth Paine (ASU), Kinley Ragan and Dr. Jan Schipper (Phoenix Zoo) are happy to have arrived in Costa Rica after months of active preparation. The team gives thumbs up and peace signs as they wait for the shuttle outside of the San Jose airport with 400 pounds of equipment and supplies. Getting through customs with only minor questions was a huge relief.

STEM education for the win! Biologist Kinley is learning a ton about how technology, engineering and math help conservation scientists in the field. Acoustic ecologist Dr. Paine is programming the "nodes" that will be set up in the forest and send signals to the "gateway". The nodes have acoustic sensors and send reports to the gateway to activate alerts when illegal hunting activity is detected. There is a lot of trial and error involved in this process. And coffee.






More STEM! Team members test the gunshot detection system's range. That white stick/pole is an antenna that helps the nodes "talk" to the gateway, or hub of

the detection system. Ultimately, when a gun is fired within range of one of the nodes, a signal will be sent through the detection network that alerts park officials about the concerning activity. The National Park team can see where the noise was detected, greatly speeding up their response and increasing the

chances of catching the hunters and discouraging future poaching attempts.

¡Adelante! The success of this project depends on the diverse strengths of our team. Here you see Marilyn (left), Diego (center), and Roci (right) from ProCAT Costa Rica, a long-timer partner of the Zoo. They are responsible for the community-based activities in the grant including establishing relationships with farmers and community members along our wildlife corridor, working on forest restoration efforts, leading conservation education programs for youth in the region, and also helping to implement the gunshot detection system

The gunshot detection system is focused in and around protected areas. La Amistad International Peace Park straddles eastern Costa Rica and western Panama and is home to the largest remaining jaguar population in Costa Rica. Restoration and economic livelihood activities will focus on creating and protecting habitat patches in between larger parks and protected areas. Jaguars need a safe route to move between these bigger areas. This project continues our long-term efforts to secure a "corridor" connecting Costa Rican jaguar populations to each other, helping ensure that the smaller coastal populations are not isolated to the point of local extinction. We look forward to sharing more snapshots from our trip in May!





historical native ranges and potentially include a water feature for behavioral enrichment, which is the act of providing animals with mental and physical stimulation to increase natural and healthy behaviors.

This project will contain a centralized multi-use holding building, allowing flexible use by keepers in providing animal care. In the fall we were thrilled to report that the Zoo was awarded \$768,000 from the Arizona Office of Tourism (AOT). The AOT grant program, entitled Visit Arizona Partnership,

was rolled out to assist productions that directly support jobs in the travel and hospitality sectors and increase Arizona tourism.

Planning, fundraising, design and approval process will begin this winter (a 12-month process), with an additional 12-month construction period.
