



Celebrating 60 Years of the Phoenix Zoo



t's been said that diamonds are formed under pressure. Never forget, though, they aren't formed overnight.

There is, perhaps, no better way to articulate the diamond anniversary of our beautiful, resilient Phoenix Zoo.

In the spring of 1961, Robert E. Maytag, grandson of the founder of the Maytag appliance company, called a small group of friends together at his home to discuss the idea of building a zoo in the city of Phoenix. The idea soon took off as Maytag and his "dedicated bunch of amateurs" proceeded to garner support from other Valley leaders. The Arizona Zoological Society held its first meeting on April 27, 1961.

Robert Maytag's unexpected death from pneumonia in March of 1962 at age 38 was nearly the death knell for the Zoo. Even the staunchest Zoo backers reeled under the blow. Then Nancy Maytag stepped forward, declaring the Zoo would be completed on schedule as a memorial to Bob. It was the call to action the community needed. Individuals, families, clubs and companies all came forward with help, giving wherever it was most needed.

"Build the Zoo in '62!" began gracing buses, delivery trucks, moving vans, shopping carts,

grocery bags and vacant buildings. Family memberships were sold for \$5 a year. Every news reporter, station manager and radio announcer was hit up for a promotional spot. Social clubs, professional societies, auxiliaries, school groups, unions, sororities and fraternities all felt the pinch.

Finally, on November 21, 1962, Nancy Maytag cut the ribbon before a crowd of thousands, officially opening the Maytag Zoo, named in her husband's honor.

With the name changed to the Phoenix Zoo in 1963 to encourage community involvement, the early years of the Zoo continued to be a financial struggle. Building the Zoo was one thing; keeping it going was another. After Nancy Maytag's resignation from the Arizona Zoological Society, Earl L. Bimson, a banker, stepped forward to provide the Zoo with the strong leadership and stability it needed for the next 13 years.

Other early supporters of the Zoo included Eugene and Nina Pulliam, owners of Central Newspapers, Inc., including The Arizona Republic and The Phoenix Gazette. Believing the young Zoo needed great leadership to grow and thrive, the Pulliams paid the salary of the Zoo's director for five years as "an "anonymous friend of the Zoo." Under the leadership of Eugene Pulliam, the state news media continued to follow the story of the Phoenix Zoo closely, keeping up public interest and noting with pride every Zoo birth and every improvement at the facility.



Most gratifying of all, the community itself supported the Zoo. From the steady donations of money, goods, services and labor there was only one conclusion to draw: Robert Maytag's original premise was true - that the people of Arizona wanted a world class zoo.

Originating with the ambitious vision of a dedicated philanthropist and other community leaders, the Phoenix Zoo has welcomed nearly 50 million guests to date, fulfilling its mission of providing experiences that inspire people and motivate them to care for the natural world. Beginning in 1962 with Operation Oryx, one of the world's most successful global wildlife conservation programs, it has become world renowned for its contributions to the field of conservation science. Today, more than 7,000 Arabian oryx exist world-wide, setting a precedent for subsequent successful Phoenix Zoo conservation initiatives involving black-footed ferrets, Chiricahua leopard frogs, Mexican gray wolves and many others.

Born of a spirit of community and the efforts of a small group of dedicated volunteers, and carefully nurtured through the support of millions, the Phoenix Zoo has enjoyed a truly remarkable first 60 years. With your continued support, our next 60 years will inspire millions more, connecting them with the natural world in new and fascinating ways.

The Cutest Babies You've Probably Never Seen

n early September, we had a young Chacoan peccary (or "tagua") born to parents Pebbles and Cheerio at our Chacoan peccary habitat on the Tropics Trail! And on September 18, we had two additional young Chacoan peccaries born, this time to parents Trix and Cheerio.

Trix (yes, there really is a breakfast cereal naming theme!) is the second of two females that arrived from San Diego and were introduced to our herd as a Species Survival Plan (SSP) breeding recommendation earlier this year.

In fact, these are the first births of this species at the Phoenix Zoo since 2014 and it marks our return to active participation in breeding per SSP recommendations.

The Chacoan peccary was first described by western science in 1972. The wild population was very small and extremely localized to the Chaco region of Paraguay. Rapid agricultural expansion in the Chaco region posed a serious threat to this little-known species. In 1986, the government of Paraguay, in partnership with the San Diego and Lincoln Park Zoos as well as other stakeholders, created "Proyecto Tagua." This project established a captive herd in Paraguay to serve as a reservoir population for reintroduction attempts and to allow research on this poorly understood species. By the early 1990s, this captive herd had grown in size to the point where more space was needed. The decision was made to transfer animals to an additional remote location in order to establish a separate captive population as insurance against catastrophic loss in the extremely localized Chaco population. The Phoenix Zoo became involved with Proyecto Tagua at this point through financial support of the in situ research in Paraguay and by serving as the initial location for the first population of Chacoan peccaries outside of Paraguay.

Phoenix was chosen as the site for this first group of animals due to the similarity of climate to the peccaries' native Chaco region and the Zoo's ability to hold Permanent Post Entry Quarantine (PPEQ) animals. In 1992, planning began for importing Chacoan peccaries to Phoenix. This proved to be a very challenging project, but in 1996, three male and seven female Chacoan peccaries arrived at the Phoenix Zoo. They reproduced readily, and eventually animals were transferred to other North American zoos and to Europe. The Phoenix Zoo has continued to be involved in Proyecto Tagua through financial contributions and conservation grants.

Our newest arrivals (along with the rest of the herd) are visible at the Chacoan peccary habitat on the Tropics Trail next to the Galápagos tortoises.



Aptly named Nugget the Alpha Goat, Mark's beer garnered the attention of Zoo staff who loved his fun approach to brewing and his deep connection to the Phoenix Zoo.

It was only fitting that Mark be involved when we decided to launch our Phoenix Zoo Dino Brews. Playing off of a dinosaur rock band theme, three of BRIs most popular brews were rebranded as Tyrannosaurus Rox Amber, Hëädbängër Haze IPA and Shredder! Mexican Lager. These limitededition dino brews are featured on a monthly rotating tap at the Zoo's Kettle Korner. Besides being tasty thirst-quenchers, the dino brews feature the artwork of acclaimed Valley comic book artist Jay Fotos, whose credits include Locke & Key, Spawn, Sam and Twitch, GODZILLA, Transformers and Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles. The fantastic artwork can be found on branded stickers that come with each purchase as well as dino brew merch available online soon!

Though these brews go extinct when Dinosaurs in the Desert closes on April 30, 2023, Mark will no doubt continue to find his weekly "goat zen" at Harmony Farm. And what's next on tap? He says, "nothing is in the works, but I could see a Chutti beer in my future." Greater one-horned stout, anyone?



hen you hear the word "glass," you tend to think of something fragile... yet at the Phoenix Zoo it has become synonymous with strength, dedication and love. This may be seen in the beautiful work of Chris Klein, the artist who has created the stunning glass tile walls at the Zoo's entrance. As one of the most visible fundraisers initiated by the Phoenix Zoo Auxiliary, the jeweltoned walls are comprised of commemorative glass tiles, sold individually as Handprints in Glass, Etched in Glass and Paw Prints tiles.

It all began in 2014, when the Auxiliary approached Chris after seeing some of his glass blown works at a local arts festival. Originally from Cleveland, he had moved to the Valley in 2004 with an ever-growing fascination of working with glass as a sculptural medium. Now art director of Meltdown Glass in Tempe, Chris admits that the glass tiles took some innovation and testing to perfect the design. It is an intricate process involving plaster casting, melting down the glass at 1,500 degrees, and meticulously applying color with a special glaze imported from Europe. The results are a unique, personalized way to not only commemorate the people and pets in our lives but also support the non-profit Zoo!

To date, the Auxiliary have sold an amazing 1,056 tiles with ambition to sell hundreds more. He admits, "I've absolutely loved doing it. The Auxiliary ladies are great to work with." And the feeling is mutual. Auxiliary member Susan Telesko praises his generosity, creativity and problem-solving, saying "None of these fundraisers would be possible without him!" 


